To President Biden and Secretary Fudge:

We, the undersigned members of the Campaign for Housing and Community Development Funding (CHCDF), write to urge the Biden administration to use the FY23 budget request to call for robust funding for housing and community development programs that help low-income households and communities thrive and to outline your vision for ensuring stable, fair, accessible, and affordable housing for all those in need. Even before the pandemic, the United States was in the grip of an affordable housing crisis. Today, after two years of surviving this pandemic, low-income households are even more precariously housed and in need of bold housing investments.

CHCDF is an education, strategy and action hub. The coalition of more than 70 national organizations works to ensure the highest allocation of resources possible to support affordable housing and community development. CHCDF's members represent a full continuum of national housing and community development organizations, including faith-based, private sector, financial/intermediary, public sector and advocacy groups.

We believe, as does the Biden-Harris Administration, that housing is a basic human right that everyone should be able to enjoy as part of a dignified standard of living. Even before the pandemic, however, the country was in the midst of a pervasive affordable housing crisis. One in four renters spent more than half of their income on rent, and homelessness rates were rising in communities across the country. A growing number of people have been unable to afford a place to call home, and the number of accessible homes for people with disabilities remains at low levels despite increasing need. Our nation's housing crisis disproportionately impacts people with disabilities, people of color, and women – and particularly people at the intersections of these identities – because of generations of discrimination and disinvestment. Housing costs are rising faster than wages, the Black homeownership rate is lower than before the Fair Housing Act was passed, our nation's affordable housing crisis worsening, and the supply of affordable and accessible housing and rental assistance has not kept pace. Rising housing costs, especially in rental housing, are contributing significantly to inflation.

We appreciate the administration's leadership, and respectfully urge the administration to formulate a strong FY23 budget request for affordable housing programs. Investing in housing and community development programs would be a step towards the

administration's commitment to racial equity by addressing the root causes of housing instability and homelessness. For these reasons, we are calling on the administration to propose the highest level of funding possible for affordable housing and community development resources in FY23.
